## Meet the Candidates



#### **Brad Flory, Dirtrict 1 Candidate**

Brad and his wife of 45 years, Julie, have been members of PCEA since 2010. Their son Luke is married to Jodi Steenhoek and daughter Jennifer is married to Travis Van Wyk. Their children each have 3 children and are self-employed in the Pella area. Brad retired in 2019 after almost 34 years at Pella Corporation, the last 25 years as department manager in Logistics. Prior to this he worked as a herdsman for Flying Dutchman Ranch and farmed.

Why are you interested in running for the director position? PCEA is currently a very strong organization. I would like to help continue this tradition. Our challenge is to continue to offer our customers/members outstanding service and keep expenses minimal. What do you believe is the biggest challenge facing the cooperative today? We need to anticipate the changing needs of our community while delivering service at the lowest cost for residential and commercial. Why are you interested in running for the director position? My wife and I recently served on Pella Christian Boosters for three years. I enjoyed serving as chairperson for one of those years and serving the people of the Pella Christian High School community. This would allow me to serve in a similar fashion, but without all the concession stand shifts! What do you believe is the biggest challenge facing the cooperative today? I believe the biggest challenge is finding sources of affordable, reliable, safe power in an era of increasingly burdensome regulation.
